MY GOAL FOR THE NIGHT:

**THINK
ABOUT THIS**

This month we’ll be working through a series called “Another Christmas Story.” The purpose of this series will be to walk, verse by verse, through the Christmas story. The irony is that many of the kids, while they have heard Christmas stories, haven’t really spent much time in the actual Christmas story in the Bible. As a result, they miss out of the full magnituded that Jesus’ birth had on his contemporaries, and by extension us. So, just what is the significance? How can something that meant something to shepherds, old temple servants, and unwed couples 2,000 years ago be important to sixth through twelfth graders growing up in the 21st century? As we’ll find out, quite a lot. The

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Take a moment to share a story about your best day ever. Why did you include the details that you did? How would you tell the story differently to different people? What details did you leave out? What if someone else shared this story, why would you want them to be intentional about how they do it?
- Think of the stories your family shares all the time. Who usually shares the stories with guests or new friends? Do other people make sure the story comes out just right? Give an example.
- The introduction to a book, movie, or song sets the tone for what comes next. What tone does Luke set in his gospel?
- Luke wrote this for Theophilus, a recent convert to Christianity. What do you think he was trying to communicate to Theophilus in this introduction? If you were writing an introduction about your experience with God for a new believer, how would you start?
- Have you ever been ‘Theophilus’? That is, has someone shared the story of Jesus with you in a way that changed your relationship with Jesus? How did they start? What did they say?
- What role do you think credibility and integrity have with how we share our faith with other people? In other words, does it matter that I “walk the talk”?
- As we read in verse 5, the backdrop of this story is the world of Herod which was one built on power and brutality. Somehow Luke wanted the readers to believe that Jesus was a reliable solution or answer to that brokenness. Do you think that Luke would be able to make that case today?

What You Need: Paper, pen or phone

What you Do: Many of us have someone who shared the story of Jesus with us in a way that was special. We don't have a letter from Theophilus back to Luke saying "thank you" for sharing this amazing Jesus story. Take a moment to write a thank you note, or give a shout-out to, the person that shared the Jesus story with you.

Debrief Questions:

- Who was the person that shared the Jesus story with you for the first time? What was the situation or circumstance where that took place?
- What about the way they shared the story was unique or compelling? How do you think it shapes the way that you tell the story today?

JUST FOR FUN

Rudolph Race

What You Need: Red poms, spoon, vaseline, rudolf poster, tape

What You Do: Give each player a red pom pom and a spoonful of vaseline. Players have to race to be the first person to put a red pom pom on Rudolph's nose (make sure to put a bit of vaseline on his nose as well) on the other side of the room. To play, players must dip their nose into the spoonful of vaseline then get the red pom pom to stick to the vaseline on their nose. Once the red pom is on their nose, they must move across the room and stick it to Rudolph's nose. The catch? They can't use their hands at any time.

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
