MY GOAL FOR THE NIGHT:

**THINK
ABOUT THIS**

Money is all around us. We earn it when we work, we spend it when we need things, and we give it away to benefit others. Sometimes, though, money can work its way into an unhealthy place in our lives where it becomes a master that pulls at our hearts making us feel insecure, shame, guilt, and a whole lot of other crummy feelings. Jesus had a lot to say about money. Most importantly, Jesus called out money as one of the things in our lives that pretends to have our best interest in mind, but really only wants us to serve it like a master over a slave. Jesus says that he is the "good shepherd" and "Lord of our lives" and that what he has come to give us is "life." When we choose to follow Jesus, we can begin to see money rightly, not as a master, but as a means to bless people and create positive change.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Rate the impact of money on your relationships (friends and family) from 1 to 5, with one being "not at all" and 5 being "very high." Why did you score that way?
- Have you ever experienced the tension that money often forces on people where at one moment you may feel you don't have enough money, but in another moment you feel bad for having too much?
- Read: John 10:7-13. Do you feel like money is one of the "masters" over people in our culture? How so? Do you feel like money has been a master over significant areas of your life? How so?
- Read: Matthew 16:16-22. This young man is looking for something that will bring him life. He thought that following the rules and possessions would do it, but they didn't, so he asks Jesus for guidance and Jesus says, "give away your possessions." The man went away sad because he didn't want to let go. When it comes to your story, how often do you feel like you use money or possessions to find happiness, purpose, joy, or life? What about other people?
- Jesus essentially asks us to reframe our relationship with money. How so? What would that look like for you?
- Money isn't all bad. After all, Jesus asks the man to put his money to work. How have you seen money bring life into your story or the stories of others? Do you have a story?
- What role do you think your church has in your relationship to money? How well do you think Prince of Peace helps you to have a healthy relationship with money?

PUT IT TO WORK

What You Need: No supplies needed

What You Say: The real challenge that Jesus gave to the rich young ruler was to put his money and possessions to work. What's that mean? Jesus wanted the man to use what he had first been given by God for the sake and life of other people. The first century world, like our own, was filled with people at the margins who needed help from people with means. What can you put to work? Certainly, I'm not expecting that you have money like a rich young ruler, but you have been blessed with a variety of other gifts that can change the world. Here is a list:

Time – The upside of living in the developed world is that we have plenty of TIME on our hands because we don't need to walk five miles to school each day. What could you do with your time that would bless people?

Talent – Our StuMin community is LOADED with talent: writers, scientists, naturalists, athletes, performers, debaters, communicators—how might you use these talents to bless people?

Relationships – Whether you know it or not, you have friends in high places. Teachers, parents, coaches, administrators, legislators—how might you leverage these relationships to bless people?

Location – You live in one of the greatest communities and areas in the country. How could you leverage where we sit on a map and in relationship to other places to bless others?

Opportunity – Each day windows open, conversations happen, things roll past your news feed where you can bless people. How might you use those opportunities to bless people?

Education – You are a part of the most highly educated generation the world has ever known. How might you leverage what you have learned and can learn to bless other people?
