“But the midwives had far too much respect for God and didn’t do what the king of Egypt ordered.” – Exodus 1:17, The Message

In today’s story, Pharaoh (the Egyptian king) orders that all Israelite male babies should be killed. Two midwives – Shiprah and Puah – defy Pharaoh’s orders and let the babies live. Why could these two women muster up enough courage to do what no one else seemed able to do? What was special about them?

Think about the last time you held a baby – the sweet baby smell, the heartwarming little cries, the tiny fingers and toes, the little expressions that are so innocent and pure, untouched by the knowledge of good and evil that will confuse and change them as they get older. A newborn baby is an adorable bundle of potential, an unblemished hope for a better future.

Of all the people in Egypt – the Israelite slaves worked to the bone, the Egyptian citizens living under Pharaoh’s capricious rule, all of them soaked in an atmosphere of oppression and trauma – who can see past the darkness? Who can see even the slightest spark of light? Who has a vision of a better tomorrow, a future filled with hope?

Perhaps it’s the women whose daily work is staring into the eyes of unblemished hope. Are the midwives reminded every single day that this world is teeming with potential, with goodness and light? How does regularly staring down that potential give them the courage to keep it alive, despite the risk?

How can we learn to look at our own surroundings through Shiprah’s and Puah’s eyes? Is there a way to look at what feels like wreckage in our relationships, in our communities, in our country, in our world, and find hope for something better? Can we believe in this potential so strongly that we find the courage to take action? Could the birthplace of courage actually be faith?
