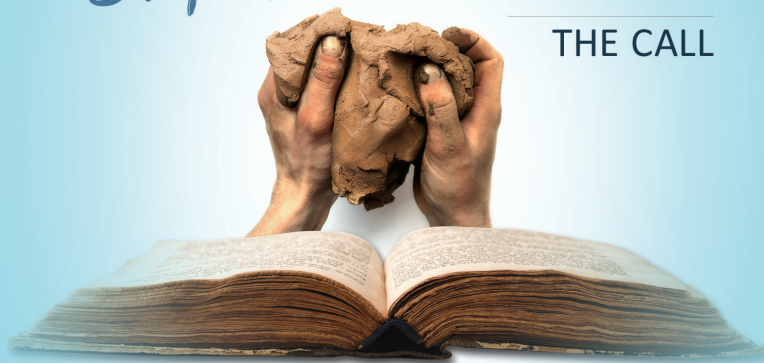

## Vayikra And God called ...

The original Hebrew name for what we know as the book of Leviticus was Vayikra, which means “and God called.” It was translated into Greek as Levitikon (relating to the Levites) and then translated into Latin as Leviticus, which remained in the English translation.

Levi was the son of Jacob and Leah, and his name became one of the tribes of Israel. The tribe of Levi was known for its priests. So it’s not a surprise that we generally assume that the book of Leviticus is about the priestly order. What are the rules and boundaries for priesthood?

Except that God calls all the people to be a “priestly kingdom.” For far too long, our Christian imaginations have been limited by the thought that this book is just an outdated priestly sacrificial system. Here are a few things God calls us to in Leviticus:

- God calls to us to tell us how to love our neighbor.
- God calls us to celebrate our joy and fellowship.
- God calls to us to make sure the least among us are cared for.
- God calls to us about how to treat refugees.
- God calls us to make amends with one another.
- God calls us to live each day with intentionality and purpose
- God calls us to come near to God who deeply loves us,  
who wants healing and wholeness in our relationships with the world and with God.

Does this sound like the Leviticus you have read or learned about in the past?

Did anything get lost in translation?

Does the list above feel like restrictions or invitations? What is the difference?

Do you think the list of things God called the Israelites to then is still relevant now? Why or why not?

Where is your place on that list? What is yours to do?
