

How do we learn to live a new way?

The Israelites had been slaves for generations, but now they're free. Now they have to figure out how to live into their new world, and how to perceive and interact with each other when they are no longer in bondage. Throughout the Old Testament there are stories of people who struggle to adjust to this new identity.

- Have you ever made a drastic change in the way you live?
 (For example, a job with a different level of authority, a relationship change, or some other change in status.)
- Did that change affect the way other people perceived you? Did it affect the way you perceived others?
- Did you struggle to live into your new identity? Did other people struggle to see your newness?
- How did the newly-freed Israelites decide who was in charge? Did someone need to be in charge? How do you create an entirely new way of being? Who makes these decisions?

In Egypt, the people only knew empire. The Pharaoh's struggle with God was about empire versus shalom. The Pharaoh was all about empire, the survival of the fittest. Empire doesn't care for the widow, the orphan or the immigrant. Empire leaves the most vulnerable behind. But God desires shalom, where the most vulnerable are cared for and protected. God chooses freedom over oppression. Generosity over selfishness. Care over neglect. Justice over Injustice. Leviticus contains an outline of that new order, and the ways the people themselves could embody God's shalom. This new order wasn't just an idea; it was meant to be lived out in flesh and bone.

- What does it look like to embody shalom today? Not in the sense of peace as an absence of conflict, but in the sense of an active, expansive desire for the genuine thriving of others? Is that a lot to ask for?
- In what ways does our culture value generosity, care, and justice?
 In what ways does it value oppression, selfishness and injustice?
- What would we do differently if we prioritized the thriving of other people?

 What would we stop doing if we prioritized the thriving of others? How does this fit into our calling?



What is yours to do?
