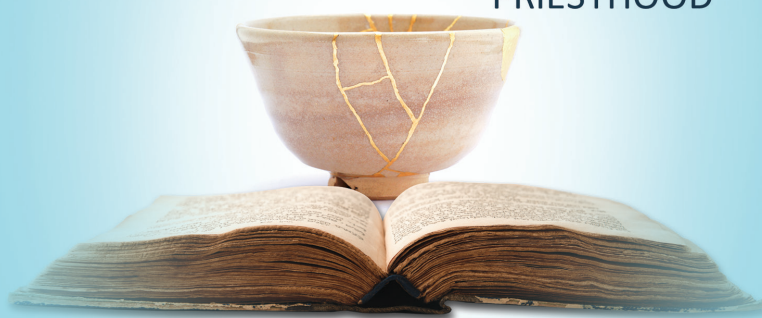

The Priestly Garment

In Leviticus 8, Aaron is adorned with an ephod and a breastpiece. We get a description of these in Exodus 28. The breastpiece was carefully woven and adorned with gold and precious stones, twelve jewels, each engraved with the name of one of the tribes of Israel. Aaron, the priest, was to wear this over his heart when he entered the holy place, so that he might “bear the names of the sons of Israel in the breastpiece of judgment on his heart when he goes into the Holy Place, to bring them to regular remembrance before the Lord” (Exodus 28:29).

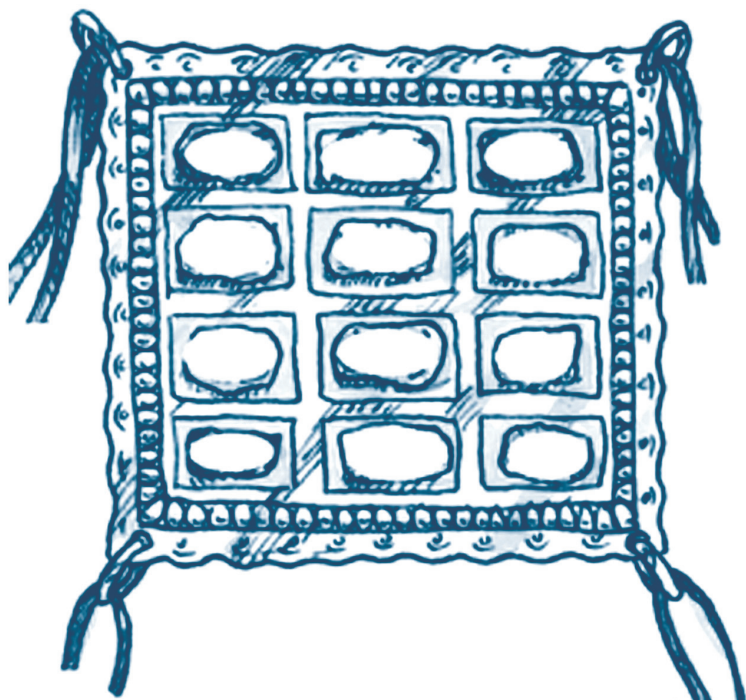
What a striking image: the names of God’s people, written on stones and carried over the heart. Each name precious. Each name remembered. Each name brought into the presence of God.

Who do you carry on your heart?

Some names come easily—parents, grandparents, teachers, pastors, mentors. Others come from quieter places—neighbors who offered kindness, friends who stood by you when no one else did, or strangers whose small gestures had deep impact.

Who are the ancestors of faith and love who carried you?

Just as Aaron bore those names before God, we too are called to carry others—to hold them in love, to lift them in prayer, to bring them before the Lord. Not just those who came before, but those whom we are sent to serve now.



Who are you being asked to carry on your heart today?

A child longing to be seen.
A friend walking through grief.
A stranger in need of shelter.
A community aching for justice.
A world desperate for peace.

As an act of remembrance and calling, we invite you to write the names of those you carry—those who have loved and served you, and those you are called to love and serve—on one of the twelve stones pictured here.

Let this be your own breastpiece of remembrance. A sacred sign that you are not alone, that you belong to a story larger than your own. In the holy presence of God, no name is ever forgotten.

Write their names. Place them on your heart. And trust that God holds every single one.
